## M 1 Task sheet for oral examinations

The oral examination consists of two parts.

**Part 1 is a monologue.** This means that you will be given time to talk on your own. You have about two and a half minutes in which to give a short presentation.

This is your task:

### My perfect day in New York


Give a short presentation in which you talk about your perfect day in New York. You must mention at least two sights or activities which you can visit/do in New York.

- Bring pictures of the sights/activities and describe what you can see!
- Express your opinion about these sights/activities and say why you've chosen them.
- Give information about the sights/activities.
- Say who you would recommend the sights/activities to and give reasons.  
**AND/OR:** Say who you would **not** recommend the sights/activities to and give reasons.

You are **not allowed** to bring any notes!

**Part 2 is a dialogue.** This means that you talk with a partner. In your examination you will be given a task which you must talk spontaneously about. To give you an idea of what you might have to do, here is a list of typical tasks for this part:

- Explain things to each other.
- Discuss a problem and find a solution.
- Slip into a role and give advice.
- Slip into a role and simulate a conversation between waiter/customer; guide/tourist; shop assistant/customer etc.
- Give your opinion about something and convince your partner of it.

**M 2 Welcome to the Big Apple**


*This task will help you to get an overview of New York's boroughs.*

## The boroughs of New York

### Text A

The city of New York is divided into five boroughs. **Manhattan (1)** is probably the best known one, for its many sights, business and cultural importance and the 11 September attack on the World Trade Center. It is surrounded by the East, Manhattan and Harlem Rivers.

It is the smallest but most densely populated borough, with 1,670,990 people living in 59 square kilometres. That is 27,227.1 people/km<sup>2</sup>! It is also one of the richest counties in the United States. Interesting places to visit are Times Square, the Empire State Building, Central Park, World Trade Center Memorial, the Guggenheim Art Museum, and the High Line.

North of Manhattan and Queens is **the Bronx (4)**. About 1.4 million people live here in an area of 109 km<sup>2</sup>. The Bronx is the second smallest borough of the five. Visit the Yankee Stadium and the Bronx Zoo with its many interesting and unusual animals. Did you know that hip hop and rap developed in the Bronx?




### Text B

Two of New York's boroughs are on Long Island. One is **Brooklyn (2)**. It has the largest population of the five boroughs, with about 2.5 million people on an area of 183 km<sup>2</sup>. Walk the special pedestrian (Foot) Bridge over the fantastic Brooklyn Bridge that connects Brooklyn with Manhattan. Visit Brighton Beach and Coney Island for a fun day (for example, see the Coney Island Mermaid Parade in June or Nathan's Hot Dog Eating Contest on 4 July).

Brooklyn's neighbour on Long Island is **Queens (3)**. It is the largest borough with 283 km<sup>2</sup>, and the second-largest in population, with 2,272,771 people. They come from 100 different countries and 138 different languages can be heard here! Many artists have chosen to live here, for example, 50 Cent. You can visit the biggest tennis stadium in the world (Arthur Ashe Stadium) or watch a New York Mets baseball game.

Not to forget **Staten Island (5)**, the second biggest borough in size. Its 470,728 people live in an area of 151 km<sup>2</sup>. If you like nature parks and woods with their wildlife, this is the borough to visit. The Staten Island Ferry connects Staten Island and Manhattan. From its deck you have a wonderful view of the Statue of Liberty, the New York Harbor and Ellis Island.

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
