Langston Hughes (1902–1967) Hughes was a ground-

breaking African American poet who wrote plays, short stories, children's books, and essays.

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He constantly voiced his sense of hope and change in his texts. He often depicted the common people and their daily lives in the black community which was characterised by oppression and prejudice.

To understand the larger context of Langston Hughes' poem I, Too, let's to back in history and read a poem by Walt Whitman (1819–1892). Whitman wrote a conf poems conveying a patriotic feeling towards America in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. I, Too is considered by many scholars to be a poetic answer to Whitman from the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.
