

Interpreting Adichie's short story *The Thing Around Your Neck* – Abiturtraining kompakt (S II)

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„On the move: migration and cross-cultural encounters“ – so lautet das neue Schwerpunktthema des baden-württembergischen Zentralabitur. Anhand der Kurzgeschichte und Pflichtlektüre „*The Thing Around Your Neck*“ der Autorin Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie lernen Ihre Schülerinnen und Schüler die Sichtweise und das Erleben einer nigerianischen Einwanderin in die USA unter interkulturellen und transkulturellen Aspekten kennen und reflektieren. Sie bauen ihre Lesekompetenz und ihre interkulturelle Kompetenz aus und bearbeiten wichtige Hintergründe kultureller Überschneidungen und Differenzen mit abwechslungsreichen analogen und digitalen Methoden wie einem VENN-Diagramm oder LearningApps.

Who is Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie? – Meeting the author

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, the author of the short story *The Thing Around Your Neck*, is an educated Nigerian born woman living in Lagos (Nigeria) and the USA. She is a very renowned Nigerian author and feminist who has gained international acclaim for her novels, essays, talks and short stories.

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie – About the author

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie was born in Nigeria in 1977. Her father was a professor at the University of Nigeria where she started to study medicine. At the age of 19, Adichie continued her studies in the USA where she graduated with a degree in Communication and Political Science. A few years later, she continued her studies and earned a master's degree in creative writing as well as in African History from Yale University. Adichie was awarded with several prestigious prizes and honours. In 2003, her first novel *Purple Hibiscus* and in 2013, her most famous novel *Americanah* were published, both novels awarded with several book awards. *The Thing Around Your Neck* belongs to a collection of short stories which were published under the same name.

The Danger of a Single Story in 2009 belongs to Adichie's most famous talks. In 2014, the TIME Magazine called Adichie one of the most influential people in the world.

What is typical Nigerian and typical American? – Nigerian-American influences in the short story

M 4

The Thing Around Your Neck is an American-Nigerian short story combining typical elements of Nigerian culture with elements of the American (Western) world. Both clash when Akunna, the Nigerian protagonist, tries to find her place in the USA.

Info box: Elements of Western culture in Nigeria

Nigeria is Africa's most populated country. It became independent in 1960. Before its independence, it was occupied by British forces and became a British protectorate in 1901. Due to the strong Western influence, Nigeria's official language (in addition to more than 250 ethnic groups and their own languages and dialects) is English. Many Nigerians have used this connection to the Western world as well as their language skills to leave Nigeria and emigrate to America to become part of the Western world and its way of life.


Tasks

The Thing Around Your Neck – A typical Nigerian short story of migration and intercultural encounter?

The Thing Around Your Neck describes the migration story of a young Nigerian woman. Migration from Nigeria (or Africa) to the USA has been a significant phenomenon influenced by various factors including education, economic opportunities or family reunification. Is the short story a typical story of migration? Here, you will find background information that will help you to understand the short story better.

Focus on the documentary *Black N Black: African immigrants vs. African Americans*

African Americans are descendants of those brought to America through transatlantic slave trade or other reasons, while African immigrants are individuals who have chosen to migrate to the USA for various reasons. One of the reasons is the fulfilment of their (economic or social) American Dream. Both groups have a diverse cultural heritage shaped by the influence(s) of their countries of origin. Zadi Zokou's documentary *Black N Black* explores the relationship between African Americans and African immigrants who both suffer from stereotypes and misconceptions as well as their reasons for being or migrating to the USA.
