

Neel Mukherjee: *The Soldier's Tale* – The challenges of migration

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In der Kurzgeschichte „The Soldier's Tale“ von Neel Mukherjee untersucht ein alter Erzähler den Antrag eines Asylbewerbers und prüft dessen Angaben auf Unstimmigkeiten und mögliche Fälschungen. Die Skepsis und Zweifel des Erzählers spiegeln den demokratischen Prozess der Bewertung von Flüchtlingsanträgen wider, die oft auf den Erinnerungen und Erfahrungen von Einzelpersonen beruhen und einer subjektiven Interpretation unterliegen. Die Geschichte wirft Fragen nach der Komplexität der Wahrheit, der Zuverlässigkeit mündlicher Zeugnisse und dem moralischen Gewicht von Entscheidungen über das Leben von Menschen in den Kontexten von Migration und Asyl auf. Die Arbeit mit der Kurzgeschichte regt die Lernenden dazu an, über komplexe Themen wie Wahrheit, Gerechtigkeit und Migration nachzudenken. Sie trägt dazu bei, den Studierenden und Schülern zu helfen, die Welt um sie herum besser zu verstehen.

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Competences and skills:

The unit contains texts and tasks that can be classified as level B2/C1 (*Europäischer Referenzrahmen*). Engaging with materials not only practises students' **reading abilities** but also develops their skills in **explaining** and **analysing** texts, especially when delving into both non-fictional and fictional extracts. Collaborative activities such as group **discussions** and **brief presentations** foster the development of **speaking and presentation skills**. Additionally, activities like video-based question answering sessions offer valuable exercises for training **listening and viewing skills**. Furthermore, **creative writing tasks** serve a dual purpose, targeting both **writing proficiency** and **vocabulary expansion** among students.


