Eine der Herausforderungen im Englischunterricht der Klassen 5–7 besteht darin, eine Vielzahl von Grammatikthemen möglichst anschaulich zu vermitteln. Das vorliegende Material ermöglicht es den Schülern, verschiedene Grammatikbereiche in einem interessanten landeskundlichen Kontext zu wiederholen und damit zu festigen. Dies geschieht im Rahmen eines Lernzirkels, so dass ganz nebenbei selbständiges und eigenverantwortliches Lernen der Schüler gefördert wird. Aufgrund der Einbindung von LearningApps kann der Grammatiklernzirkel auch digital im Homeschooling durchgeführt werden.
